²Your premium is free if you have Full Extra Help and choose a plan that offers basic coverage at or below the Extra Help Premium amount for your area.

³You will pay either \$60 or the plan's standard deductible for people without Extra Help, whichever is cheaper.

⁴You will pay either 15% or the plan's standard coinsurance for people without Extra Help, whichever is cheaper.

• If you have Medicaid, a Medicare Savings Program (QMB, SLMB or QI-1) or Supplemental Security Income (SSI), you do not have to apply for Extra Help.
